

FYC 6620 (11021): Program Planning and Evaluation for Human Service Delivery*
Summer 2020

Course Description: This course provides graduate students in family, youth and community sciences with the necessary skills for the development, delivery, and evaluation of health and human services programs. Emphasis will be placed on widely used program planning and evaluation models and on initiatives for promoting behavior change. Course assignments and projects may be tailored to the interests of students.

Course Objectives

One or more of the following process-related and substantive objectives must be met during the course of the semester:

- ✚ Students will practice skills required to plan, monitor, and evaluate health and human services programs.
- ✚ Students will apply behavior change theories to inform program actions and guide evaluation of outcomes.
- ✚ Students will create a program and evaluation plan for a health and/or human services agency.

For the content area of *Program Planning*, students will

- ✚ Describe the basic elements and principles of program planning
- ✚ Develop a logic model to describe program outcomes and processes
- ✚ Identify theories to inform program actions
- ✚ Compare and contrast various methods of assessing community needs and assets
- ✚ Compose measurable program objectives and design a feasible program to meet objectives

For the content area of *Evaluation*, students will

- ✚ Describe the major concepts and principal methods in program evaluation
- ✚ Understand the purposes and uses of evaluation
- ✚ Understand the balance between scientific rigor and programmatic considerations in real-world evaluation

- ✚ Analyze program evaluation models and designs to inform their work
- ✚ Explore ethical issues in evaluation
- ✚ Develop an evaluation plan to measure program implementation, outcomes, and impacts
- ✚ Apply evaluation concepts to their research interests

Course Purpose and Procedure

This course is designed to provide students with an opportunity to gain or enhance their knowledge related to program planning and evaluations of family, youth and community sciences programs. This course is completely online and is asynchronous. Students should expect assignments designed to facilitate inquiry surrounding course concepts. Please complete all assigned readings and all assignments on schedule. Students are expected to engage both actively and constructively in this course as a regular participant in the online discussion forum. Discussion among colleagues is an important form of learning as it promotes critical thought and exposes us to diverse perspectives. We should all make every effort to create an engaging environment for substantive discussion from which we can all benefit. Students will contribute to online discussions by responding to the instructor's and other students' posts. Failure to participate in online discussions may result in a lower grade than expected. You will receive an email notification regarding low participation prior to assignments being graded.

Course Requirements/Assignments

1. Reflection Papers. Short reports, no less than 2 pages and no more than 3 pages, on the assigned readings will be required most weeks. These papers are designed to help students reflect on the readings and apply course concepts to their areas of interest. Students should complete all assigned readings and be prepared to critique the readings and apply them to their professional practice or interests. Assignments should be uploaded to Canvas by **noon on Monday of each week**. Each student will complete a total of six reflection papers. **(25 points X 6 assignments = 150 points total)**

2. PPE Assignments

PPE Assignments will center on practical aspects of program planning and evaluation to meet process-related course objectives. The Instructor will post on Monday and students should respond **by noon on Thursday**. Each student will complete a total of four PPE Assignments. **(25 points X 4 assignments= 100 points).**

3. PPE Design and Data Collection Presentations

Each student will select **two** readings for which they will serve as lead discussant. Selections will fall under two categories: 1) Evaluation Design and 2) Data Collection. Students may select a topic based on their personal interest when possible. Students will post a PowerPoint presentation (with voiceover) describing their topic (methods and data collection procedures) along with identifying and discussing three recent and relevant journal articles on the topic. **(50 points X 2 assignments = 100 points)**

4. Program Planning and Evaluation Project.

Students will develop a program plan and evaluation proposal related to their area of interest. This project will be divided into four parts, including: 1) Situation Statement and Planned Approach 2) Objectives, Activities, and Outcomes 3) Performance Measurement and Evaluation Plan and 4) Full Proposal and Presentation. **(400 points)**

Evaluation and Grading:

Students may earn a maximum of 750 points in this course. Grades will be based on performance related to course requirements and assignments. All deadlines must be met. Any assignment turned in late will receive a 10 percentage point reduction in the final grade. The following grading system will be used: A (95% or higher), A- (90-94%), B+ (87%-89%), B (83%-86%), B- (80-82%), C+ (77%-79%), C (73%-76%), C- (70-72%), D+ (67-69%), D (63%-66%), D- (60-62%), and E (\leq 59%).
