Course description (UF Catalog):

Ethics and ethical decision-making by professionals working with individuals and their families is addressed. Emphasizes ethical issues related to family relationships and family life.

<u>Class goal and objectives:</u> The goal of this course is for all students to gain an understanding of ethical conduct within the areas of research, writing, and professional behavior within the human service professions. Upon completion of this course, students will:

- Understand why ethics are needed in research
- Be able to engage in research in an ethical manner
- Understand legal issues associated with human service work
- Know what plagiarism entails and how to avoid it
- Understand ethical decision-making for human service professions
- Have an awareness of the common ethical issues for human service professionals
- Be able to apply professional ethics in real life situations

Assignments and grading:

1. <u>Syllabus search:</u> Our first assignment will entail finding information from the syllabus so that you can familiarize yourself with the course and policies. This assignment will be worth 10 points. This assignment is due **September 7.** *Total points:* 10

- 2. <u>Modules and assessments:</u> The course is organized into 12 modules, which are available in the Modules section of the Canvas course. Each module will entail assigned readings, and also will likely include video(s) and/or recorded lecture(s). After reviewing all the materials, please complete a quiz for each module in Canvas. Each quiz is worth 10 points (see schedule below). You are welcome to work ahead on the modules and quizzes, but must complete the module no later than the due date (during most 2 week periods there will be 2 modules due). *Total points:* 120
- 3. Exams: There will be three essay exams given online, each worth 100 points; the lowest grade will be dropped, so if you are happy with your grades on the first 2 exams you may skip the third exam. Exam 1 will take place September 26, Exam 2 will take place October 24, and Exam 3 will take place **November 30**. While the exams will be open book and open notes, they will be TIME LIMITED (120 minutes), so if you require extra time based on established academic need please let me know and provide your documentation ahead of time so that I can provide extra time within the Canvas system. You may take your exam at any time within the exam window (from 12am-11:59pm) but must complete the exam by 11:59pm, so please plan accordingly (i.e., make sure that you start the exam early enough so that you have the full amount of time to complete it by 11:59pm). It is not permissible to get assistance in completing the exam from others; doing so would constitute academic dishonesty, and would lead to referral to the Dean of Students Office. Please use your own words in completing the exams – cutting and pasting from other sources is considered plagiarism, and incidents of this type will also be referred to the Dean of Students Office (it is okay to copy and paste from your own personal notes, written in your own words). Total points: 200 (lowest exam will be dropped)
- 4. <u>Project:</u> Choose one of the codes of ethics provided in this course. Provide 2 examples that can be real life experiences, news stories, made up stories, or take place in media (in movies, TV shows, or books) that present an ethical dilemma for your chosen profession. Describe the scenario and explain which ethical issues are relevant to the dilemma. How is each dilemma resolved in real life, your story, or the movie, show or book? Do you agree with how it was resolved, or would you do something differently? Explain why. A rubric will be provided in Canvas. *Total: 70 points*

Optional extra credit: Introductory meeting: I want to get to know you as a student! This assignment will entail signing up to meet with me via Zoom or phone for around 15 minutes so that I can learn more about you as a student and so that you can have an opportunity to ask me any questions you might have. It is helpful to have this meeting early in the semester, so in order to get the extra credit, this assignment must be completed by the due date. While I am happy to meet with you at other times after this introductory meeting, this is the only meeting that will have points associated with it and can only be done once for credit. The meeting must be completed by **October 7** in order to receive points. *Total points: 10*
