S.D. Lynne-Landsman is a co-investigator working on the "Communities Mobilizing for Change on Alcohol" environmental intervention. In this capacity, she works with University of Florida and Cherokee Nation investigators in the development, implementation, and evaluation of the community-level intervention.
